





Bus Trip to San Diego

Our bus driver Jan Cervinka took 17 riders to the park where we met up with Tim & Lori Kis, Karen Miller and Eleanor Rejzek. Also attending the celebration this year were the Consul General and Deputy Consul of the Czech Republic in Los Angeles Michal Sedláček and Tomáš Kara with their respective families and the Vice-Consul of the Slovak Republic Milan Kováč.

Members of the House of Czech and Slovak Republics baked delicious traditional pastries that were offered for sale along with coffee and bottled water. Enjoyed by all were the sausages with sauerkraut and pickle that were available for purchase as a traditional Czech/Slovak meal. Potato pancakes were added to the menu this year. The sausages and pastries were a highlight of our annual trip. There was even a booth this year with authentic Slovakian items for sale.

The traditional folk dance and music performance in the park began with welcome speeches from Czech Consul General Michal Sedláček and Slovak Vice-Consul Milan Kováč. After the American, Czech and Slovak anthems were sung, the song and dance performances began. This year's cultural lawn program featured singer/accordionist Anna Hradsky, singer/guitarist George Svoboda, folk group "Karicka", and the Folk Dancers of Balboa Park.

Anna Hradsky was welcomed back after a ten-year absence and her singing was a refreshing change from our previous trips. George Svoboda played amazing guitar music as he serenaded us. Both singers performed wonderfully. "Karicka" performed Slovak dances and the Folk Dancers of Balboa Park performed the Czech dances. The program was very exciting and well received by all. The accordion group did not play this year, and there was no audience dance participation at the end of the program as in past years.

The House of Czech and Slovak Republics is open every Sunday from noon until 4:00 pm. The special Czech and Slovak heritage celebration is presented each year on the third Sunday in October. In addition, there is a special meeting of compatriots every second Sunday of the month at the Hall of Nations. The next steps with e-mail (Beginning advanced E-mail)

You should now have an ISP connection and an E-mail account set up, now we have to learn the proper things to be used with e-mail so we are good network citizens. There are several things we should do with e-mail to ensure we keep friends as well as our neighbors and ourselves safe and sane on the Internet.

The first rule of good e-mail use is never put more into an e-mail than needs to be there. Remember how e-mail works, it is available for anyone and everyone to read – once you press the send button, that message is no longer yours, you have no control over where it goes or who sees it. E-mail as it travels across the web can be read by anyone at any time, and anyone that gets a copy of your e-mail can forward or resend it to any one they wish to, in fact your e-mail could go around the world (and in less than 80 days). Many send e-mails to ALL their friends because someone said this is a major issue, and to send a copy to everyone in your address book. The truth is most of these are hoaxes and as such, just use up Internet band width (meaning they clog up the internet). Before you send one of these on, check it against the web site <u>www.snopes.com</u> to see if it is a hoax or not. Also, just because someone adds the line "This has been checked on Snopes" does not mean that it is true – check it yourself before sending it on, adding the above tag line has caused some that were once true or partially true to be passed on, when they are now not true. Besides sending this to everyone in their address book they do so by adding everyone as either "To:" or "CC:" - which means every copy of the note has their entire address book listed in it – a big present for any spammer that might get this in his/her in-box somewhere down the road. A spammer

is a person who sends out unsolicited e-mail (electronic junk mail). They beg, buy and steal e-mail addresses, so don't make it easy for them.

How do you send an e-mail to a bunch of people and not put their e-mail addresses at risk? Easy, use the "BCC:" addressing line on the e-mail. When you use BCC: each person gets their own copy of the message. Remember the old days, when the secretary (now called an AA – Administrative Assistant) would type your letter on a typewriter (maybe manual even), they would get a sheet of Letterhead paper, several sheets of carbon and thin white paper and type the whole thing up with the "To addressee" getting the Letterhead copy, each person on the CC list getting a carbon copy and the guy in the corner who asked to get a BCC (blind carbon copy) and you getting a copy that had the BCC on your copies. In other words everyone knew who was "TO" and "CC" but only you and the boss knew about the "BCC". The same applies for any e-mail sent BCC, only the sender knows who all got the message, each recipient only knows about their copy (and any TO or CC addresses included). My basic rule is, if I send an e-mail to more than one person, I use BCC unless everyone **NEEDS** to know who got the e-mail. The only time I do this is to schedule a meeting with 3 or more people and we all have to agree on a date and time. By sending e-mail to groups using BCC you will make it more difficult for spammers to collect e-mail addresses.

The next step in fighting against spam is to remove unneeded information from an e-mail before sending it on to someone else. This helps cut down on bandwidth waste, and will help speed up the Internet. When you receive an e-mail, edit out old addresses and other useless information in the message, your e-mail will get to its destination faster. The process for sending an e-mail involves what is called store and forward – when you send an e-mail it may have to make many hops (movement from one location to another) – I would guess the average e-mail makes anywhere from 3 to 10 hops. When the e-mail is sent it is stored temporarily, the destination interrogated then it is added to a queue by size (the smallest at the front and the largest at the back), it eventually gets forwarded on to the next hop, where it is stored, evaluated and forwarded on again until it finally reaches its destination. Every time something smaller comes along it crowds in front and will go first – if you want your mail to get there fast. Make it small/smaller.
