We have had the privilege of viewing two of the exhibits here in Los Angeles and will have others displayed at future Annual Heritage events.

We said farewell to Consul General Michal Sedlacek as he returned to the Czech Republic with his family. We welcome new Consul General Pavol Sepelak. We are grateful to Mr. Sedlacek and his staff for all they did to support the Czech communities in California during his term here at the Czech Consulate in Los Angeles. It was during Mr. Sedlacek's term that Sokol Los Angeles was able to secure funds from the Czech Ministry of Foreign Affairs to help support our cultural and heritage activities. We received a total of \$946 in 2012 via SVU-LA, \$3054 in 2013, \$4414 in 2014 and \$6584 in 2015. The majority of these funds are used to support Czech language classes and our Annual Heritage Event with added funding in 2015 for co-sponsoring the Annual Czech School Conference held in Los Angeles. Requests are submitted in July each year with distribution the following April.

I am thankful to my Sokol family and friends for your understanding and gracious support throughout 2015 during the "tough" times. It is good friends and family that helped me through it all. I believe I am now back on track and have found my "groove"!

John J. Zitny, 1930--2014

John Zitny was born in Chicago, Illinois on November 9, 1930, to John and Sophie Zitny. He passed away on June 12, 2014 at the age of 83 after a short illness due to cancer.

His parents moved to Garden Grove, California, in October 1949 while John was attending North Central College in Naperville, Illinois. In February 1950 he transferred to the University of Sothern California where he received his BA in 1951 and his law degree in 1955. After working for a firm in Santa Ana, John opened his own office in Buena Park, California in 1956. He became active in the community and served as Chairman of the Buena Park Planning Commission, President of the Jaycees, Chairman of the March of Dimes and Secretary of the North Orange County YMCA. In the 1970s he was a founding partner of Zitny, Hathaway and Kerr. In 1980 he was in the first group of attorneys to be certified as a Family Law Specialist by the State Bar of California. On two separate occasions, he was selected by his peers as a Super Lawyer®.

John is survived by his loving wife Shirley; his children: sons, John R. Zitny (Sue) of Yorba Linda, Barron Zitny (Pam) of Orange, Justin Zitny of Coeur d'Alene, Idaho; daughters: Sonja Novovesky of Fort Collins, Colorado and Sherri Christiansen of Corona. He is also survived by 14 grandchildren and two great granddaughters. Also surviving are his step-children Gayle L. Miller, Gregg W. Miller and Rebecca Hilgen.

Florence Zelenka Fagnan, 1916 -- 2014

Florence was born on December 12, 1916, in Cleveland, Ohio. She passed away October 29, 2014 at the age of 97. She resided in Granada Hills, California at the time of her passing. Florence was an active member of CSA Lodge Los Angeles 458 and of Sokol Los Angeles since joining in March 1989.

Florence was preceded in death by her Husband Gerald Fagnan, daughter Barbara Prine, father Alois Zelenka, her mother, stepmother, brothers Louis and Joe, and sisters Marie and Bertha.

She is survived by her grandson Mike Prine, brother Bill, sister Jeanette and many nieces and nephews. Her son-in-law passed away shortly after her death.

Mildred Kelly, 1917 -- 2014

Mildred was born on April 26, 1917 and passed away October 29, 2014 at the age of 96. She joined Sokol Los Angeles in January 1959. Mildred and her husband made the meals at Sokol Hall for the annual spring and fall dinner dances for many years until they were no longer able. After her husband passed away, she moved to a retirement community and spent the last years of her life in a managed care facility.

Marvin Jay Roter, 1936--2015



Marvin (Marv) passed away peacefully in Saugus, CA, on Sunday, January 18, 2015, with his wife Lillian by his side. He was born in Trenton, NJ, to Meyer and Fay (Levy) Roter on June 17, 1936. The family moved to Burbank, CA in 1940. Marv graduated from San Fernando High School in 1954 and studied engineering and art at Los Angeles Pierce College. During the summers Marv slaved away at his father's electroplating shop, longing for a career in storytelling and cartooning.

After high school, Marv joined the Air National Guard; his unit was called to active duty in 1961. He served as a member of the 146th Air Transport Wing from October 1, 1961 to August 1962 -- honorably discharged from the Air National Guard and Air Force Reserves on August 31, 1962.

Although Marv had a love for art and writing, he worked as an aerospace engineer in Southern California for 35 years. After retirement from engineering he wrote and published his first Sci-Fi novel, *A World to Die For* in January 2000. His second novel, *The Three Circle Charm*, was published in May 2012. Before his passing he had already started writing a sequel to his first novel. Marv's creative mind took him to worlds beyond those we know and, with his gift, was able to share it with others.

Marv and Lillian moved to Saugus in December 1993. Marv loved to sing and joined the Men of Harmony barbershop chorus and Silvertone Singers mixed choral group, both in Santa Clarita, CA. He also joined the Golden Pen writers' group in Santa Clarita to broaden his writing skills and meet others with his passion for writing. He and his wife joined American Sokol Los Angeles, a Czech/Slovak organization, to learn more about Lillian's ancestral customs and to study the Czech language for a trip to the Czech Republic – not an easy undertaking. Marv also had a passion for old cars and was restoring his favorite – a 1964 Chevy Impala acquired from an aunt.

Marv is survived by his wife of 22 years, Lillian; his stepmother, Lee Roter of West Hills, CA; his sons: David Roter (Andrea) of Simi Valley, CA & Daniel Roter (Kim) of Santa Monica, CA; his stepchildren: Virginia Rodriguez (Glen Cruden) of Santa Cruz, CA and Patrick Rodriguez (Valerie) of Carlsbad, CA; eleven grandchildren and two great-grandchildren; his siblings: Ted Roter (Brenda) of Northridge, CA; Joseph Roter (Keiko) of Chatsworth, CA; and Eva Rivas (Roger) of Santa Clarita, CA; four nephews, one niece and many extended family members.

Marv was a thoughtful, kind and gentle soul who touched the hearts of those he met. He will be greatly missed by his many friends and family and will be remembered for his wit and his suspenders. In honor of his wishes, a celebration of his life was held on February 7, 2015, at El Trocadero restaurant in Newhall, CA.

Jaromir Strizka, 1919--2015



Jaromir was born on June 22, 1919 in Czechoslovakia and passed away March 13, 2015 at the age of 95. He resided in Hollywood, California at the time of his passing.



In his younger days he was a pole vaulter and had qualified for the 1940 Olympics before the Games were

canceled because of World War II. He fled his homeland with a friend after the war try came under Communist Party rule. They walked across the border to Austria and later

when the country came under Communist Party rule. They walked across the border to Austria and later emigrated to the United States.

In 1953 Jaromir established a musical instrument distribution and retail company, European Crafts, Inc., in Studio City, California and successfully rebuilt his fortune. He ran the business until 2014. A self-made man who shaped his own destiny, he had strong ties in the Los Angeles music industry.

Jaromir was a true philanthropist – his satisfaction came from helping others in his community without regard to personal recognition; his concern was to do good with the resources he shared. His estate donated \$15 million to Providence Saint Joseph Medical Center. Jaromir's association with Providence Saint Joseph stretched across more than 30 years. Through his gifts to Providence Saint Joseph, he demonstrated his desire to advance the future of community health care and support the countless patients who will benefit from his generosity. The hospital Emergency Department will be named in his honor.

Jaromir said he gave to the hospital because he believed it was the right thing to do. In 2013 he said, "This is my hospital and I want it to be the best it can be." He left the bulk of his estate to St. Joseph because of the quality of care he received there in the later years of his life.

A cat lover with no children and only distant relatives, he also left \$5 million to the Pasadena Humane Society & SPCA. In commemoration of this donation, the largest the shelter has ever received in its 113-year history, the Animal Shelter will be renamed after Strizka. According to the shelter, Jaromir regularly donated to several animal welfare organizations. He had a lifelong respect for animals.

Rockford George Hanken, 1945 – 2015



Rockford (Rocky) was born on July 8, 1945. He passed away in his sleep on April 24, 2015 at the age of 69. He left behind his beloved wife of 42 years, Kathy; two children Samantha and Richard and a brother Garret. He was born in the United States, attended the University of Southern California, and served in the Navy during the Vietnam War. He worked over 25 years with IBM, over 25 years with his own company, and over 12 years as an adult educator and administrator. Rocky was a friend who improved the world around him. He will be sorely missed by all who had the opportunity to know him.

Rocky joined Sokol Los Angeles in 2004. He regularly attended monthly meetings and participated in Sokol L.A.'s Czech language classes held at Pasadena City College. He also actively participated in Sokol L.A.'s social functions.

A service was held in his honor on June 13, 2015 at the Rice Mortuary in Torrance where family and friends shared their memories.

Danny Klega, 1923 – 2015



Danny was born Dušan Klega on December 29, 1923 in Czechoslovakia. He passed away on July 14, 2015 at the age of 91. He loved the cinema and, while he didn't achieve matinee idol status, he did build quite a resume of character actor roles from 1962 to 1970 according to the Internet Movie Database.

Danny and Doris Klega rolled double sixes during a long-life filled with love and countless movies. They both had an adventurous youth, and the path on which they met began forming during World War II. Danny, who grew up in Czechoslovakia, was imprisoned in a German forced-labor camp but he escaped after a while.

"He made his way to France and landed a job on a cargo ship that traveled the world," his daughter Darcy wrote in a remembrance of her dad. "It was most thrilling for him to find that the ship was eventually going to dock in America. He said he always dreamt about America! This was a chance of a lifetime, and he decided to 'jump ship' and stay in New York," she wrote.

During this period Doris, age 14, was half a world away, living with her parents in Bombay, India, where her father was the Czechoslovakian Counsel General to India. With war breaking out, her mother brought Doris and her brother to America in 1944 and put them in a boarding school in Massachusetts.

In 1949 both Danny and Doris ended up in New York City. One evening both showed up at a Czech club called Sokol, Doris recalled, and it was essentially love at first sight. He spoke no English and she spoke Czech. They danced a bit, chatted and he asked for a date. They went to a movie in Times Square, ate hot dogs and drank Cokes. "He was very fun to be with and he was good looking," Doris said. "And he was a good tap dancer. He loved to tap dance."

After a two-month courtship, they married and kept the news from their parents for a while. Danny was a machinist and lost a job in 1951. They, like many other young couples, decided to hit the road in search of a better life. "We came to California on Route 66. We packed up our '51 Buick with our possessions. We came to Santa Monica and stayed in a motel," Doris said.

Danny wanted to be an actor and made the rounds of the studios, but he didn't have much luck. He got a job as a machinist at the Anheuser-Busch plant in Van Nuys and they built a little house in Topanga Canyon. In 1959 they moved into what is now West Hills, California. But Danny still had the acting bug and he kept his toe in the water, so to speak, and it finally panned out.

In 1962 he landed a character role in "Four Horsemen of the Apocalypse"

starring Glenn Ford. He played a German Lieutenant. He also had a guest-starring role on Gilligan's Island playing a Russian Cosmonaut and had a featured role in "The Russians Are Coming, The Russians Are Coming" playing Polsky alongside Alan Arkin and Thedore Bikel. Jerry Lewis adored him and cast him in his TV Variety show and then in the movie "Which Way to the Front". Additional credits include: Combat, Mission Impossible, Torn Curtain, Guide for a Married Man and many more.

The couple that met at Sokol came to Tinseltown on storied Route 66 and had a long loving marriage that lasted 66 years. That adds up to double sixes and a life well lived.

Danny was a lifelong member of Sokol -- first in Ostrava, Czechoslovakia as a boy following his mother's lead who was also a Sokol all her life. Then joining Sokol Los Angeles in 1961 where he retained membership throughout the rest of his life. His daughter Darine Klega is currently secretary/financial secretary for Sokol Los Angeles -- a third generation proud Sokol!

Gary Riddle, 1944 -- 2015



Our beloved husband, father, grandfather and friend, Gary James Riddle, age 71, born in Fresno May 6, 1944, passed on July 31, 2015 of Pancreatic Cancer. He retired from the State Dept of Water Resources after 38 years. Gary was an avid Hot Rod fan as well as a builder of Street Rods. He was in the process of building a 1954 Chevy Truck given to him by his late father-in-law. He was a remarkable man who could build, fix, or create anything. There was never a time when a friend in need would call and he would drop everything to help. He loved his family more than anything. He always joked if he'd known having grandchildren was so much fun, he'd have had them first! He kept his sense of humor up

until the end, always making us laugh.

He was preceded in death by his parents Zella and Rodney Riddle. Gary is survived by his wife of 47 years, Cheri: sons: Jared (Laurie) and Ryan (Stacy); grandchildren: Mackenzie, Madelynn, Lane, Layla and Bella; sister Patricia Berryman, as well as many loving sister/brother-in-laws, nieces and nephews.

George Azadian, 1921 -- 2015



George J. Azadian, World War II veteran and longtime Sokol member, passed away on October 2, 2015 at the age of 94. He was born September 9, 1921 to an Armenian father and a Slovak mother and had two sisters and a brother.

Having lived so long and through such a significant time in history, George had a huge range of experiences. His heroics included his Navy career in WWII and the Korean War. Some of his many successes were graduating from USC in Chemistry, becoming the International Consultant for CF Braun and Co. (a global petroleum engineering business), designing his home in San Marino, and speeding around in a Jaguar XK150. George married the love of his life, actress Maria Cortez; the two shared a happy life of trips to

Yosemite, sailing, entertaining and traveling. A tragedy in George's life was Maria passing away from cancer within a year of George's retirement.

What made George even more exceptional were his everlasting charm and charisma, his care and responsibility to those important to him, and his zest for life that never faded. Up until the end, George was busy hosting dinners and visiting old and new friends. He was involved in many organizations, including Sokol Los Angeles. During the last 10 years of his life George was able to connect with his relatives in Bardejov, Slovakia and he developed a special bond with them, hosting them annually for visits to his home.

George's life stands as a reminder to the importance of The Greatest Generation, the value of a life well lived, and the preciousness of love, where, 38 years after his wife's death, Maria was never far from his thoughts or missing in his conversation. And to the writer of this obituary, his great nephew, he was an irreplaceable source of advice, friendship and inspiration.

Iva Prochazka, 1933 -- 2016



Sister Iva was born on March 2, 1933 and passed away on February 26, 2016 at the age of 82. Iva was a dedicated Sokol for over 47 years.

Iva served as a Director of Women and was responsible in teaching physical education and calisthenics for numerous Sokol Slets in America and abroad. She was a gymnastics instructor to many children, instructor at Dinkey Creek Camps, and teacher of Czech language. She participated in both national and international Sokol slets, and she participated in Czech plays early on. She was a member of a Czech Folk Dancing group and a leader in many Czech Scout Camps. For the Czech Beseda, Iva taught the debutante

dances. She also taught gymnastics at YWCA in Glendale and was a gymnastics instructor in a local gym club for over 15 years. Many local kids knew her as a merry crossing guard. Her smile was contagious and she loved everyone she met.

Iva is survived by her loving husband Mila, her son Martin, daughter Brigit and grandchildren. She will be remembered with fondness by all whose lives she touched.

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Conference of Czech Schools in Los Angeles

In June this year, the Consulate General of the Czech Republic in Los Angeles had the pleasure to host an annual conference of Czech Schools in North America. The formal part of the Conference took place on Saturday, June 6th and Sunday, June 7th, and was attended by as many as 24 participants from 12 Czech schools: Dallas, Pittsburgh, Chicago, Atlanta, Washington DC, Seattle, Portland, San Diego, Orange County, Los Angeles, San Francisco, and Durham NC. After the welcoming remarks by the Consul General, Michal Sedláček, a discussion panel was led by the Czech Deputy Minister of Education, Jaroslav Fidrmuc, followed by remarks by Ambassador Petr Gandalovič. 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
Christmas Luncheon – December 19, 2015
